

What Does It Cost?

You pay the fee when you sign up for the garden plot. The fee is different for each plot size:

20 x 20 feet - \$20.00

50 x 50 feet - \$40.00

There is water available in some of the gardens for you to use. These gardens are Maple and Augusta, Highway 54/Oneida, Church Road, and Mental Health Center. You need to depend on Mother Nature or haul your own water for the other gardens.

How Do I Sign Up?

Sign-up for garden plots will take place in each of the garden locations for spaces at that location. The weather determines when the soil is dry enough to plow and divide into plots so the date when we have sign-up changes every year. A schedule will be posted in each garden. If we have to change the date, it will be posted in the gardens one week before. Translators will be available during garden sign-ups.

Garden Schedule

The gardens will open when it is time to plant in Green Bay. Our growing season is generally from May to October. Different plants grow best in certain temperatures. When you sign-up for your plot we will give you a chart that tells you what plants to plant in the spring and what to plant later on.

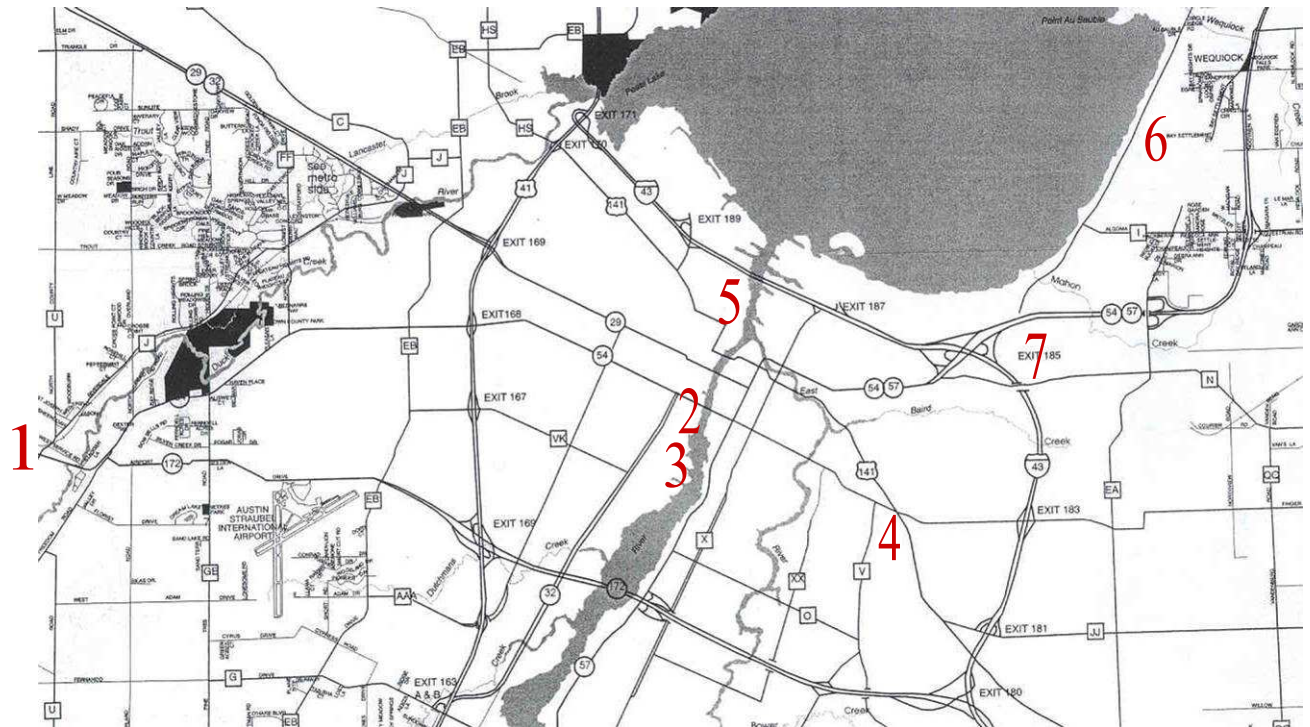

What are Community Gardens?

Community gardens are places where people can rent, for a small seasonal fee, their own garden plot to raise produce. These gardens also contribute to a more livable environment, promote a more positive community image, and create opportunities for neighbors to work together. Community gardeners know that gardening and plants are good for people and their neighborhoods.

How Do They Work?

UW-Extension works with land owners to make land available for community gardens. This provides garden space for people who do not own their own land. The land is plowed and ready for you to plant. The garden land is measured off into plots that you can rent for a small one-time fee for the growing season. You get to keep all the food that you grow in your garden. Use it, share it, sell it if you have extra – you decide.
