PROCEEDINGS OF THE BROWN COUNTY
LEGISLATIVE SUB-COMMITTEE

Pursuant to Section 19.84 Wis. Stats., a regular meeting of the **Brown County Legislative Sub-Committee** was held on Tuesday, June 21, 2011 in Room 200 of the Northern Building – 305 East Walnut Street, Green Bay, Wisconsin.

Also Present: Ellen Sorensen, Supervisor Carole Andrews; other interested parties

1. **Call Meeting to Order:**

The meeting was called to order by Chair Mike Fleck at 5:00 p.m.

2. **Approve/Modify Agenda:**

Motion made by Supervisor Erickson and seconded by Supervisor Kaster to approve the agenda. Vote taken. MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY

3. **Approve/Modify Minutes of February 22, 2011:**

Motion made by Supervisor Erickson and seconded by Supervisor Kaster to approve the minutes. Vote taken. MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY

4. **Communication from Supervisor Andrews re: to review the policy by which reclassification takes place in County Departments and to create a more specific procedure that better spells out the responsibilities of all parties. *Referred from January 27, 2011 Administration Committee.***

Supervisor Andrews stated that this communication is the result of some confusion with regard to the process of reclassifications. She felt that many times an individual attends a standing committee meeting to discuss a reclassification, but often they do not know they need to follow through and attend an Executive Committee meeting as well. The purpose of this communication is to get this procedure spelled out and in writing so everyone knows what to expect.

Supervisor Erickson indicated that he felt it should be the responsibility of the department head to inform the employee of the process since the department is seeking the promotion. Erickson suggested that this be referred to Human Resources or Administration to draw up a standard policy.

Motion made by Supervisor Erickson and seconded by Supervisor Kaster to refer back to Human Resources to develop a structured procedure and also be required to notify the appropriate department or supervisor when the standing committee and Executive Committee is to take place so they attend. Vote taken. MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY

Supervisor Kaster added that in the event there is already a procedure setting forth this process, that Human Resources provide it to this Sub-Committee.

5. **Discussion of shared lobbyist with Outagamie County.**

Motion made by Supervisor Erickson and seconded by Supervisor Kaster to suspend the rules and combine Numbers 5, 6, 7, and 8. Vote taken. MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY

Director of Administration Ellen Sorensen stated that Outagamie County currently has a lobbyist in Madison and indicated that they (Outagamie County) would be interested in partnering with Brown County to share this lobbyist. Currently Outagamie County is paying their lobbyist approximately \$120,000 annually for salary and benefits. For Brown County to share this lobbyist the cost would be about \$40,000 and Sorensen felt this could be structured in a multitude of ways. The benefit of this would be that Brown County would then have someone at the Capitol in Madison looking out for the needs of the County as many of the issues that the lobbyist is pursuing on behalf of Outagamie County are the same issues that Brown County has.

Erickson asked if the \$40,000 was on top of the \$120,000 and Sorensen stated that the \$40,000 would offset the \$120,000. It was questioned why Brown County would offset one-third instead of a half and Sorensen stated that this was because Outagamie County was also going to approach Winnebago County to see if they were interested in sharing the lobbyist as well. Sorensen stated that if Brown County and Winnebago County both wished to share Outagamie County's lobbyist, we would then have a lobbyist that would be representing approximately ½ million people in the Fox Valley. Sorensen advised that she does need to speak with County Executive Troy Streckenbach about this, but indicated that former County Executive Hinz felt this partnership would be a good idea.

Motion made by Supervisor Erickson and seconded by Supervisor Kaster to have the Department of Administration investigate this further and report back at the next Legislative Subcommittee meeting. Vote taken. MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY

6. **Report on County Ambassador Program meeting with Legislators.**

Sorensen stated that WCA has not recently had a County Ambassador Program meeting with the legislators due to extra sessions.

7. **Report on Legislative Actions and Proposed Actions in Madison.**

At this time Sorensen addressed Items 7 & 8 together. She stated that the day before the Assembly took action, the Joint Finance Committee made amendments to trump the Budget Repair Bill in certain areas. These areas include an amendment to allow the Sheriff's managerial staff to be exempt from the 5.8 Wisconsin retirement contribution and health insurance.

Another amendment was that shared revenue would only be cut by 25% which would bring another \$883,000 into the budget. GTA for the Highway Department would also be changed thus lessening the \$371,000 deficit because more money would be put into general transportation aid. Sorensen stated that from what she has been able to interpret the County is picking up some dollars towards the budget.

Sorensen also addressed the issue of concealed carry of firearms and stated that the Dane County lobbyist has expressed concern in that this may mean that people would be able enter government facilities such as the zoo and golf course with a concealed weapon. Kaster stated that he has been to a number of other states that already have concealed carry laws and they have "no firearms allowed" signs posted in many places. He felt that if there was a concern of

firearms at government buildings or anywhere else, signs should be posted prohibiting firearms in those areas.

WHEREAS, municipal and county boards make policy decisions on a number of important questions without regard to party or faction; and

WHEREAS, in the state legislature, power is concentrated toward party caucuses controlled by the party leadership and votes many times break strictly on party lines; and

WHEREAS, such party factionalism was warned against by our nation's Founding Fathers, including our first President George Washington; and

WHEREAS, states such as Nebraska, Minnesota and Nevada either have or have had state legislative bodies where members were elected without party designation; and

WHEREAS, such non-partisan members of the legislature can vote without being beholden to party loyalty or apparatuses controlling their funding for election; and

WHEREAS, such non-partisan members of the legislature can vote in the best interests of their constituents and their state and vote in the manner of their beliefs without being forced to demonstrate party loyalty.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association, in conference assembled, does hereby support legislation to establishing non-partisan elections for the state legislature and all elected county offices.

Relating to

Recommending the State of Wisconsin Keep Its Current Recycling Program

WHEREAS, the Governor's proposed biennial budget includes provisions that would end the statewide recycling program, which has been in place for nearly two decades; and

WHEREAS, the proposed budget would significantly impact the county's recycling program in a number of ways:

1. It would reduce or eliminate the associated state funding, which could have a significant impact on landfill tipping fees. Outagamie currently pays \$1.2 million per year from its landfill tipping fees into the State's Recycling Fund. Of this, \$800,000 per year is returned to us by the state in the form of a recycling grant. The county has, therefore, subsidized this fund in the amount of \$400,000 per year. The proposed budget looks to eliminate the \$800,000 grant without eliminating the county's \$1.2 million payment. The proposed budget then looks to divert dollars from the Recycling Fund to economic development and environmental initiatives. Further, the elimination of our \$800,000 grant and similar grants throughout the state would have a profound impact on the long-term viability of our Tri-County recycling program. The new \$9.8 million regional recycling facility that our Tri-County Partnership opened in 2009, as part of a 15-year plan, has proved to be a profitable business venture. However, the viability of future recycling within our service area and around the state depends upon receiving grant monies back from the landfill tipping fees paid into the state's Recycling Fund.
2. It could significantly impact the environmental gains the county has achieved through its recycling program. Recycling protects the environment, preserves precious landfill capacity, and conserves energy and other natural resources. Conservation is important considering the globally-limited supplies of energy and natural resources. Our Tri-County recycling facility sends 30,000 tons per year of recycled material to Wisconsin paper mills and another 15,000 tons per year to other buyers. These materials are diverted from our landfill and further provide a source of affordable raw materials to local businesses.

3. It would eliminate, rather than create, jobs in our region. Recycling creates good local jobs, many more than landfilling. Our regional recycling facility directly employs 30 workers, mostly in the private sector, plus indirectly creates numerous other jobs, while turning a significant profit. If recycling were to be shut down, many fewer employees would be needed to landfill the recyclables, without direct benefit to the environment and local businesses. The proposed budget threatens to turn a profitable, environmentally sound business model into, at best, a crippled recycling program that would generate significantly greater costs for the county and local communities or, at worst, end the recycling program along with its direct and collateral benefits for the environment, local businesses, and our local communities.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association, in conference assembled, does hereby recommend that the State of Wisconsin continue the statewide recycling program, because of the benefits it has provided to more than 1,000 municipal recycling programs and the successes it has brought throughout the State over nearly two decades; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association does recommend that the state of Wisconsin continue statewide recycling grants, equivalent to 100 percent of the monies collected from the \$7.00/ton landfill-generated Recycling Tipping Fee, which is presently placed into the Recycling Fund; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association does recommend that the State of Wisconsin avoid taking monies collected from the \$7.00/ton landfill-generated Recycling Tipping Fee, which is presently placed into the Recycling Fund, by redesignating the money for economic development and environmental funding and then using it for unintended purposes.

Relating to

Opposing the Centralization of Income Maintenance Programs

WHEREAS, part of the mission of Eau Claire County is to safeguard the well being of its citizens; and

WHEREAS, changes in eligibility standards and co-pays could prevent some of our low income elderly, families, children and disabled from being able to afford medical care; and

WHEREAS, any short term savings from such cutbacks are likely to be offset by extensive social and economic costs including, but not limited to, the increased need for imprisonment, emergency hospitalizations and irreparable damage to the emotional and physical development of some of our youth; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin has a long history of providing social services through county government; and

WHEREAS, these programs include eligibility determination for Family Care and the Caretaker Supplement, Medicaid, BadgerCare and FoodShare; and

WHEREAS, in Eau Claire County those services are provided by the department of human services economic support unit; and

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin has failed to demonstrate centralization is effective. Currently the State of Wisconsin is under a Corrective Plan of Action with Food and Nutrition Services (FNS) through the USDA because of their untimeliness in processing BadgerCare Core and FoodShare cases centrally at the ESC (Enrollment Services Center). As of March 2011 the ESC had over 4,000 cases still unprocessed within 365 days. Currently agencies could be fined with liquidated damages of \$250 per case when errors are identified and not corrected within 30 days of notification; and

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin currently contracts the BadgerCare Core Plan program and services for the childless adult population to Hewlett Packard (aka Enrollment Service Center or ESC) and ESC's error rate for handling applications is more than 3.2% compared to the average county error rate of 1.3%; and

WHEREAS, for federal fiscal year 2009 and 2010, Eau Claire County DHS has maintained a 100% payment accuracy rate and a 100% negative action accuracy rate. Eau Claire issued over \$24 million in FoodShare benefits in 2009 and 2010 with an economic impact on the community of \$44 million. Eau Claire County DHS is participating as one of three pilot agencies in the implementation of regional models with the goal of improved customer service delivery while effectively managing increasing agency workload; and

WHEREAS, the proposed 2011-2013 biennial budget calls for the centralization of these programs, thus eliminating local access to economic support services; and

WHEREAS, the Eau Claire County February 2011 duplicated totals for BadgerCare and elderly/disabilities coverage is 16,568 citizens and for state food stamps/FoodShare benefits is 11,553 citizens; and

WHEREAS, without the knowledge and experience of local personalized assistance, many of these citizens may lose their benefits; and

WHEREAS, adverse changes in eligibility along with system delivery design modifications would limit access creating a whole new tier of uninsured/underinsured citizens causing increased medical care costs.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association, in conference assembled, does hereby oppose any changes to the Medicaid law that will reduce the eligibility or increase the co-pays of our most vulnerable of citizens and also go on record opposing the centralization of these services and encourage our State's legislators to vote against this portion of the Governor's biennial budget.

WHEREAS, compounding the issue is the Budget Reconciliation Bill's inclusion of a \$700 million cut in the FoodShare Program and cuts to the Medicaid program; and

WHEREAS, each of these programs is vital to the health and basic well being of the citizens of Outagamie County; and

WHEREAS, these cuts will harm children and hinder the ability of Outagamie County's low-income families to achieve self-sufficiency.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association, in conference assembled, does hereby oppose the cuts to the Child Support Program, Food Stamp Program and Medicaid and support the restoration of funding at the federal level to maintain programming at current levels.

WHEREAS, Western Dairyland EOC Inc. was established in 1966 by action of the county boards of Buffalo, Trempealeau, Jackson and Eau Claire as a Community Action Agency (CAA) under the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964; and

WHEREAS, Western Dairyland is one of 16 CAAs in Wisconsin which serve to address the needs of individuals and families living near the bottom of the economic ladder by providing opportunities leading to economic and social advancement; and

WHEREAS, Western Dairyland creates economic opportunities for low income people by:

- Involving low income people in identifying and developing solutions to local poverty problems;
- Creating new jobs and developing small businesses;
- Building skills through employment training, financial education and other programs;
- Assisting low income households to build assets such as home ownership;
- Strengthening families and providing educational opportunities to children, youth and adults;
- Developing and managing affordable housing;
- Improving the availability and quality of the community child care providers;
- Providing emergency food resources to pantries, as well as providing subsidized meals to low income children enrolled in child care;
- Improving energy efficiency through home weatherization;
- Providing health and dental services to children and adults;
- Recruiting volunteers to serve the needs of community organizations and institutions;
- Conducting research and preparing funding applications to meet the needs of our community; and

WHEREAS, Western Dairyland and its sister community action agencies serving the poor in Wisconsin receive federal Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) funds to provide services to low-income individuals and families and CSBG funds are critical to the continued success of Western Dairyland; and

WHEREAS, Western Dairyland is governed by a board of directors representing a cross-section of the community consisting of: one-third are representatives of the poor, one-third are elected public officials representing the county boards, and one-third are representatives of business and community groups from the area served; and

WHEREAS, President Obama's budget calls for reducing funding for CSBG by 50% and members of Congress have proposed deeper cuts; and

WHEREAS, the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors believes the services and programs provided by Western Dairyland are important to the county and the loss of any significant level of CSBG funding would be a detriment for the families and communities in the county, but also in recognition of the need to address domestic spending.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association, in conference assembled, does hereby support funding for the Community Services Block Grant at 2008 levels to sustain efforts to achieve economic stability for people in need, for our common good.

Supporting Legislation Repealing the 1992 County Tax Levy Rate Limit

WHEREAS, under current law and subject to a number of exceptions, no county may impose an operating levy at an operating levy rate that exceeds 0.001 or the operating levy rate in 1992, whichever is greater; and

WHEREAS, "operating levy" is defined as the county purpose levy, less the debt levy, and "operating levy rate" is defined as the total levy rate minus the debt levy rate; and

WHEREAS, a county may exceed the limit under current law if its board adopts a resolution stating its wish to exceed the operating levy rate limit that is otherwise applicable and if that resolution is approved by the electors of the county in a referendum; and

WHEREAS, the limit may also be exceeded if a county increases the services that it provides by adding responsibility for providing a service transferred to the county by another governmental unit; and

WHEREAS, counties will soon reach a point where the property tax rate limits will not allow counties to increase the revenues to meet the imposed levy limits; and

WHEREAS, under proposed legislation, the operating levy rate limit does not apply to any county levy that is imposed after December 2009; and

WHEREAS, this resolution supports repealing the 1992 county property tax levy rate limits.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association, in conference assembled, does hereby support legislation repealing the 1992 county property tax levy rate limit.

WHEREAS, legislation is being proposed that would reduce the interest rate on delinquent property taxes to 0.5 percent per month for each month that the taxes remain unpaid; and

WHEREAS, this proposal would result in approximately a \$435,000 revenue loss to Outagamie County; and

WHEREAS, this resolution opposes reducing the interest rate on delinquent property taxes.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association, in conference assembled, does hereby oppose any interest rate reduction on delinquent property taxes.
